## Kelley Criticized for 'Brutality'

Justice Department field reports from Missouri, intended for official eyes only, severely criticize Kansas City Police Chief Clarence M. Kelley for his handling of police brutality cases. Kelley is President Nixon's latest choice as permanent director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

"There have been several incidents in the last two years of perceived severe police brutality against minority citizens," stated one report filed from Kansas City last year. "No meaningful efforts have been made ... to show the public that the (Police Department) will not tolerate excessive use of force by its for men

The report called on the Justice Department in Washington "for assistance in dealing with these situations." The But one report has ever followed up in the recommendation.
