MARSHALL TO REVIEW SURVEILLANCE CASE

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WASHINGTON, Dec. 26—
Associate Justice Thurgood
Marshall of the United States
Supreme Court agreed today to
hear arguments on whether the
Federal Bureau of Investigation
should be barred from monitoring a political convention of
young Socialists.

Justic Marshall scheduled
oral arguments in his chambers
at 11 A.M. tomorrow. The convention of the Young Socialist
Alliance is set to open on Saturday in St. Louis.

On Dec. 13 Judge Thomas P.
Griesa in Federal District Court
in New York issued a preliminary injunction prohibiting the
F.B.I. from "attending, surveiling, listening to, watching
or otherwise monitoring" the
convention.

That decision was overturned Tuesday by the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit. The alliance and its parent Socialist Workers Party appealed to Justic Marshall to reinstate the injunction.

The Socialists had argued that F.B.I. surveillance of their meetings inhibited attendance, impaired their constitutional rights of freedom of association and resulted in information being give nto other Federal agening give nto other Federal agencies that then questioned party members about it when they sought Government jobs.
