Minneapolis, Oct. 28 (AP)- Former Congressman Walter Judd, campaigning for Republican candidates in Minnesota this week, says the flowers sent to presidential aide Walter Jenkins have cast a shadow over the FBI.

Judd told a news conference Monday he is not raising the question himself, but heard it raised "four times last week in Washington." The question, he said, is whether the FBI has been compromised by perverts within its own ranks.

"The public wonders if there has been some sort of impropriety involving FBI agents. That would be devastating," Judd said.

FBI headquarters in Washington said there would be no comment on Judd's statements.

An FBI spokesman said last Saturday that J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the FBI, ordered flowers sent to Jenkins in a hospital out of sympathy for Jenkins and his family. The flowers were sent before President Johnson ordered the FBI to investigate the case, the FBI said.

Judd did not mention the FBI explanation. He called on Hoover to explain the flowers.

Jenkins resigned as a White House aide after disclosures that he twice was arrested on morals charges in Washington.
