

Senator Cautions America

The FBI, CIA 'Threats'

Senator Joseph S. Clark (Dem-Pa.) warned Americans yesterday to be wary of the "military-industrial complex," the FBI and the CIA.

Speaking of the radio program "Reporters' Roundup" Clark said, "There are three major threats to the successful survival of American democracy."

The first, he said, "is that military-industrial complex which General Eisenhower warned us against, which is evidenced in very high quarters by our strong support of

military regimes in various parts of the world and by the enormous impact which the military and their industrial partners exercise over public opinion and on the members of Congress and the Senate.

"The second danger," Clark continued, "is the CIA, an intelligence agency which

we've got to have, which practically every other nation has, which I think in our country has achieved a position of power pretty close to the danger line.

"And the third," he said, "is evidenced by recent disclosures in the newspapers of the FBI and the threat they pose to the privacy of the individual citizen and the further threat they pose by way of blackmail, direct or indirect, on anybody who has the effrontery to say anything unkind about Mr. J. Edgar Hoover."
