

FBI Chief Attacks King

Blacks Call Hoover 'Senile'

Washington

Two Negro civil rights leaders, including a former aide to Dr. Martin Luther King, said yesterday FBI director J. Edgar Hoover was senile for suggesting King didn't deserve the Nobel Peace Prize.

Hoover was quoted in Time Magazine as saying King was "the last person in the world who should ever have received" the prize. He also held King in contempt "because of the things he said and because of his conduct." Hoover was quoted as saying.

The Rev. Walter Fauntroy, an aide to King in the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said, "I am not in the habit of commenting on the babblings of senile public officials," but said he was present at a King-Hoover conference and "I must brand as categorically untrue the statements al-

leged by Mr. Hoover in the Time article."

The Rev. Mr. Fauntroy and the Rev. Douglas Moore, militant chairman of the Washington Black United Front, said it is time for Hoover to leave office.

The Rev. Mr. Moore said Hoover is a "senile sadist" who consistently supports the segregationists and has no

sense of honor or history."

He said, "The continued character assassination by Hoover is disgraceful and demeaning to the office that he holds."

The Rev. Mr. Fauntroy and the Rev. Mr. Moore are candidates for a non-voting delegate to Congress from the District of Columbia.
