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ACCUSED AGENT SEES LAXITY ON KENNEDY

LAXITY ON KENNEDY CHICAGO, May 20 (UPI)— Abraham Bolden, Secret Serv-ice agent charged with attempt-ing to sell Government files to an accused counterfeiter, said today that he was being false-ly prosecuted because he had planned to reveal to the Warren Commission "laxity" in protect-ing President Kennedy. At a news conference in his South Side home today. Mr. Bolden said that in July, 1961, he was assigned as a guade-for the President at Hyannis Port, Mass. During that time, he said, the special agent in charge bought three cases of beer and three cases of whisky and agents drank it before and after their tours of duty. That same summer, Mr. Bol-den said, agents assigned to guard the President used Gov-ernment cars to transport girls to and from parties. United States Attorney Ed-ward V. Hanrahan called Mr. Bolden's charges "fantastic al-legations." He said that their accuracy should be judged by Mr. Bolden's silence from 1961 until after his arrest yesterday. 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Kennedy Guard's Charge Is Studied

WASHINGTON, May 22 (UPI)—The commission investigating the Kennedy sassination has asked the Federal Bureau of Investigation to look into allegations by a suspended Secret Service agent of heavy drinking among the White House detail.

J. Lee Rankin, counsel to the commission, said today that the contents of the re-port would determine wheth-er the seven-man group would hear Abraham Bolden.

Mr. Bolden, the first Ne-gro to serve on the White House Secret Service detail, has been indicted on charges of trying to sell a Govern-ment report to a man charged in Chicago with taking part in a half-million dollar coun-terfeiting ring. He made the drinking charges at a news conference yesterday. A Gov-ernment prosecutor has called the Bolden story "fantastic." It is assumed that if the commission decides to exam-ine the Bolden charges, it may also call others who might know about practices of Secret Service personnel.
