damaging the column through a finger-size opening called an intervertebral foramen. It is through this aperture that the 12th thoracic intercostal nerve connects with the spinal cord. The nerve controls feeling and movement on the lower right side of the body.

The bullet has been located at a point just between the 12th thoracic vertebra and the first lumbar vertebra, or just be-neath the lowest rib. Dr. Galbraith said tests had

shown there was no compres-sion on the spinal cord and no blockage within the spinal canal, but he said there was little doubt in his mind that the bul-let had "traumatized" the spinal cord and damaged the inter-costal nerve.

Nevertheless, Dr. Galbraith predicted that barring unfore-seen complications, Mr. Wallace "should be able to be out and about" within four to six weeks about" within four to six weeks if the second operation takes place within the next week to 10 days. The additional surgery, he said, will not greatly im-prove the Governor's chances for the recovery of the use of the lower part of his body but

is necessary to prevent tuture complications such as infection or excessive scar tissue.

or excessive scar tissue. Dr. Balthazar Perez said there was blood in Mr. Wallace's spinal fluid. The fluid is nor-mally colorless. The second operation will take place within the next week to 10 days if the Governor's condition remains stable, Dr. Galbraith said, but he added that there had been no final decision on where the surgery that there had been no infan decision on where the surgery would be performed — here at Holy Cross Hospital, at nearby Walter Reed Army Hos-pital or in Alabama. Baltimore county jail in Tow-son, Md.

A Teporter who flew with William Bremer and his 17-year-old son, Roger, from Milwaukee to Baltimore's Friend-ship Airport said the father had told him he was appre-hensive about reprisals against him as a result of the at-tempted assassination.

The Governor was said to have read several newspapers this morning and to have shown

an avid interest in their accounts of his victories in primary elections in Maryland and Michigan. Billy Joe Camp, and Michigan. Billy Joe Camp, his press secretary, said he did not know if Mr. Wallace had seen an article in The Washing-ton Post that quoted "medical sources" at the hospital as say-ing his spiñal cord was severed and he would never walk again. Shortly after Dr. Galbraith arrived from Birmingham, Brig. Gen. Walter Tkach, the chief White House physician, came to the hospital. He said he was there to consult with the Gov-


there to consult with the Gov-ernor's doctors and declined to comment on speculation that Mr. Wallace would be trans-ferred to Walter Reed Army Hospital.

Maj. Gen. William H. Mon-crief Jr., the commanding offi-cer at the Army hospital, also came to Holy Cross Hospital today and spoke both with physicians and members of the Governor's staff. He also de-cined to comment on the possibility that the Governor would be moved.

A spokesman at the Army's A spokesman at the Army's public information office at the Pentagon said Walter Reed Army Hospital was being "geared up" for the possible presence of Mr. Wallace and members of the news media were advised to begin installing telephone lines there telephone lines there. Personnel at the military hos-

Personnel at the military hos-pital were said to have been preparing its Presidential suite today. The four-room complex, which includes a kitchen, was offered to Mr. Wallace yester-day by President Nixon. A spokesman at the hospital said Mrs. Cornelia Wallace, the Gov-ernor's 33-year-old wife, would be permitted to stay in the suite be permitted to stay in the suite should his second operation take place there, but his chil-dren would not be allowed its use.
