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Mrs. Wallace's Plan for Assassins

Cornelia Wallace, wife of Alabama's Governor George Wallace, believes the men who shot her husband and Senator Robert Kennedy should be administered drugs or put under hypnosis to discover if the incidents were products of conspiracies.

"I don't believe in torture or abuse for anyone," Mrs. Wallace said Monday in an interview in Montgomery with the Christian Science Monitor.

But she said drugs or hypnosis would be the only way the American public can know the truth, for no holds barred, to have anything that we have available to find out the truth . . . barring torture or abuse."

She referred specifically to Arthur Bremer, convicted of shooting Wallace, and to Sirhan Sirhan, the convicted assassin of Kennedy.

Hypnosis can be ordered by a federal judge, but testimony gathered from it cannot be used in federal court. Testimony from truth serum type drugs also is inadmissible, a Department of Justice spokesman said.

Mrs. Wallace said she based on hunches her belief that a conspiracy was behind Bremer's assassination attempt on her husband.

However, a conspirator or conspirators most likely would be persons who had "the most to gain" from eliminating a presi-

dential candidate, she added.

"At first I have to confess that I thought it was the liberal element of McGovern supporters," Mrs. Wallace said, calling that group "a very Communist liberal element."

"But then when I saw the Eagleton catastrophe and some other things that happened, I think McGovern in a sense was done in, too," she said.

MRS. WALLACE URGES DRUG TO GET TRUTH

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BOSTON, Nov. 25 (UPI)—Truth serum should be administered to Arthur H. Bremer to get him to reveal a possible conspiracy behind the shooting of Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama, the Governor's wife, Cornelia, said yesterday.

In an interview with The Christian Science Monitor at the Governor's mansion in Montgomery, Ala., Mrs. Wallace said that drugs or hypnosis would be "the only way the American public can know the truth, for no holds barred, to have anything that we have available to find out the truth from him (Bremer), barring torture or abuse."

Mrs. Wallace said that her belief in a conspiracy behind Mr. Bremer's assassination attempt, which left Mr. Wallace crippled, was based on hunches.

"At first I have to confess that I thought it was the liberal element of McGovern supporters," Mrs. Wallace said, calling that group "a very Communist liberal element."

"But then when I saw the Eagleton catastrophe and some other things that happened, I think McGovern in a sense was done in, too," she said. "And the man that ended up President was Richard Nixon. So I don't know."

Mr. Bremer was convicted in August, 1972, of shooting Governor Wallace at a Laurel, Md., rally May 15, 1972.
