## Author's View of New Evidence

### Boston

Edward Jay Epstein, author of "Inquest," which challenged the Warren Commission's investigation of President Kennedy's assassination, says the possibility of a second assassin "will probably be reduced to nil" by pictures released by the Kennedy family.

Epstein, now a Harvard graduate student, said in an interview Tuesday that the pictures and X-rays turned over to the National Archives may supply conclusive proof of the Warren Commission finding that a single assassin killed the President.

"The crucial contradiction in the events that happened November 22," he said, "was that the same bullet could have wounded both Kennedy and Texas Governor (John) Connally.

"It's possible that the photographs show a path of exit for that bullet. If we now have photographic evidence that the bullet went through the President's body, this must be seen as new evidence."

This, Epstein said, would bear out the conclusion that accused assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald fired all the bullets.

"This also proves," he said, "the main point of my book — that the Warren Commission failed to examine crucial evidence.

"The Commission turned in its report two years ago. Now, at this late date, someone finds it necessary to produce vital evidence that was never considered before. Perhaps the Kennedy family felt it had to come to the rescue of the Commission."
