## 'Very Frank' Account by Mrs. Oswald

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Mrs. Lee Harvey Oswald yesterday gave a presidential commission a "very frank" account of her life in Russia with the man accused of killing President Kennedy.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, chairman of the Federal commission charged with getting the whole story of the assassination last November 22 in Dallas, Texas, said Mrs. Oswald has been questioned about virtually her entire life. He said he hoped to finish with her testimony late today.

Chief Justice Warren said most of the questioning yesterday dealt with Mrs. Oswald's life in Minsk, Russia, where she met American ex-Marine Oswald and married him. She told of her husband's attitude toward the United States, which he once renounced, and toward Mr. Kennedy.

Mrs. Oswald, who has refused to talk with reporters, seemed drawn and tired at the close of her third day of testimony before the commission.

During the three days Mrs. Oswald has told the group nothing it did not already know in substance, the Chief Justice said, but has furnished considerable detail. All of her statements have been "consistent with her earlier stories," he said.

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
