Washington, Feb. 20 (AP) Letters mx the late Lee Harvey Oswald, alleged slayer of President Kennedy, once wrote from Russia were put today in the record of a presidential commission investigating the assassination.

This was done in a lengthy closed session, in which the commission took testimony from Robert Edward Oswald, Jr., 29, elder brother of Lee Harvey. Nothing was made public on what the letters said.

Allen W. Dulles, commission member, who called Robert a "very cooperative witness," said he had turned over to the commission a number of papers, including letters received from Lee when the latter was in Russia from October 1959 to June 1962.

Robert, an employe of a Denton, Tex., brickworks, spent more than 10 hours before the commission, tellings of the troubled life of the Oswald family, and identifying correspondence for the record. He would not answer any questions of reporters.

His attorney, William A. McKenzie of Dallas, Tex., said

Robert appeared voluntarily, in an effort to shed any light possible on the assassionation, and that "se do not deem it appropriate" for him to make any statement until the presidential commission completes its work and makes its report.

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
