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Washington, June 5 (AP)- The Warren commission, just about winding up its six-month-long job of investigating President John F. Kennedy's assassination, took testimony today from his widow.

The commission reported it went to the home of Jacqueline Kennedy, who was with her husband in the limousine at Dallas, Tex., when he was shot Nov. 22. There was no indication as to the nature of her testimony.

A terse statement by the commission said its taking of testimony is about over and the group "is giving thought to the content and form of its report."

It added that the commission headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren has not as a group discussed final conclusions.

It had been reported earlier by official sources that the commission had set a June 30 target date for completing its report on the investigation.

Staff groups were reported drafting separately the several segments of what may be a ~~500xxxxxx~~ 500-page summary of a massive report. There was no indication of any new basic disclosures surrounding the role of Lee Harvey Oswald as the lone assassin.

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
