INTERVIEW BY LANE ON OSWALD IS HEARD

A tape-recording dealing with the killing of J.D. Tippitt, the Dallas patrolman slain the day President Kennedy was assassinated there, was broadcast last night by Station WMCA.

Former Assemblyman Mark Lane of New York said that the tape-recording was an interview with a woman eyewitness to the Tippitt shooting. In an interview Barry Gray of WMCA questioned Mr. Lane about the tape.

The tape allegedly records remarks by Mrs. Helen Louise Markham of Dallas. She made statements that allegedly indicated that the patrolman's killer might not have been Lee H. Oswald, the suspected assassin of Mr. Kennedy.

The tape had been in the possession of Mr. Lane. He said he had mailed it to the Warren Commission. Previously, Mr. Lane had declined to release the tape to the panel.

Mr. Lane said in introducing the tape on the air:

"One could hardly think of a description that differed more from Oswald than the description given by Mrs. Markham, the one eyewitness to the murder of Tippitt."
