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Wallace Doubts Warren Report

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Former Alabama Gov. George Wallace, who is touring the South in support of the November 1968 election, said today he doubts the Warren Commission report on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Wallace's comments were made at an airport news conference in answer to reporters' questions. He said he was not personally involved in the Warren Commission's work on the assassination and he felt "the American people are not quite satisfied with the matter of it being a murder."

Wallace said he did not know of any evidence that had been suppressed. "I said several years ago that the movement toward the assassination of political leaders creates actions and reactions in the country," he said. "And that's going to continue in the country . . . until we demand the justice department and our courts allow the jailing of those who violate the law."

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NEWS OF THE WEEK IN REVIEW

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The Louisiana Supreme Court ruled it will not revive Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr.'s denial of a change of venue for the trial of Clay L. Shaw, charged early last year with having conspired to murder President John F. Kennedy. Shaw had asked that the trial be moved out of New Orleans on the basis of international local publicity. Assistant DA James L. Arock said the defense has 14 days to appeal to the Supreme Court for a rehearing.

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
