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"PATSY"

Warren Commission Document No. 75 in almost unreadable form was released to the public in January 1971. Examination with a reading glass makes one wonder why it was ever released at

all. Such poor quality reproduction by the Government is blatantly insulting. The Government knows how to do a better job.

Special Agent Joseph J. Louffler reported an interview with Mr. Harold J. Stafford, Regional Attorney for the Department of Health Education and Welfare (HEW). The document reads in part: "Mr. Stafford informed that the Dallas files reflect several pieces of correspondence under the caption OSWALD, the repatriate, his wife and family, age 20 and baby named Jane, 4 months old . . ."

The third paragraph of the document reads:

"Mr. Stafford advised correspondence from the New York office indicates that Oswald served in the U. S. Marine Corps and went to Russia with the State Department's approval to accept employment as a radar specialist. Specifically, he went there for 2½ years and married a Russian girl."

Mr. Stafford advised in the last (4th) paragraph that HEW was to be ready on a "stand by basis" to give financial help if directed.

All this is further documented in CD 882 p 12 and CD 903 page 3.

The importance of this document is reinforced on page 194 of Manchester's "Death of a President" ". . . In less than a minute the mansion came through. Commander Oliver Hallett, in the Situation Room, was on the other end . . ." Commander Oliver S. Hallett, USN, his wife and sixteen year old daughter, Caroline, all knew Oswald and (page 31) ". . . wondered what had become of the weedy malcontent. They recalled him vividly. . ."

On page 286 Manchester writes: "Caroline arriving home from Stone Ridge School saw Oswald's picture on their set and cried, "He was in Moscow!"

It becomes more and more evident each day that Lee Oswald was closely observed and assisted by our government so that he could be on hand in the TSBD so he could be the biggest "patsy" in history on November 22, 1963.
