

Milwaukeeans Will Pause for Kennedy Rites

Milwaukee will pause Monday with the rest of the nation to honor the late President John F. Kennedy.

Much of the business of the city will stop.

There generally will be no school. Many stores will delay opening. Postal service will be curtailed.

Local and county government will come to a halt, except for necessary services.

Churches and other groups will hold special memorial services. Many churches will toll their bells from 3 to 3:30 p.m.

21 Gun Salute

A 21 gun salute will be fired during ceremonies at 3 p.m. Monday in the Memorial Center, sponsored by the Milwaukee County Allied Veterans council, which represents most of the veterans groups.

A wreath will be cast into the honor roll pool and taps will be sounded. The Blatz American Legion band will also be present.

Officials of the University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee, including J. Martin Kloische, the provost, will go to Madison Monday for a memorial tribute at 3 p.m. in Bascom hall. Some students and faculty members from UWM also will attend the service.

Father William F. Kelly, S.J., president of Marquette university, will give the eulogy at a solemn memorial mass to be offered at 4:30 p.m. Monday in Gesu Catholic church.

Father James Corrigan, S.J., will be the celebrant.

Marquette, the University of Wisconsin, Madison and Milwaukee, and other colleges and universities will be closed.

All postal and federal employees, active and retired, were invited Sunday by Pioneer branch No. 2 of the Letter Carriers association to attend a memorial mass at 11 a.m. Monday in St. John cathedral. The letter carriers, who were requested to be in uniform, will assemble at 10:30 a.m. in front of the main post office, 517 E. Wisconsin av., and march to the church.

Postal service will be the same as on Veterans' day, Postmaster Frederick C. T. John announced. There will be no carrier or window service.

Many local industrial firms will stop work for brief memorial services at 11 a.m. The American Motors Corp. will close at noon for the first shift.

Will Watch on TV

Patrick Cudahy, Inc., will halt work from 10:40 a.m. until noon. Television sets will be placed in several locations in the plant so workers can watch the president's funeral. A prayer will be offered by Father Edward Finn, S. J., of Marquette university.

Most downtown stores and many in the outlying areas will not open until 2 p.m. Milwaukee county banks will open at noon. Marshall Field & Co. at Mayfair will remain closed all day.

All county offices, except those providing necessary serv-

ices such as hospitals, will close at 11 a.m. when memorial services will be held in the county board room of the courthouse. County courts, except for three criminal courts in the safety building, will be closed.

City agencies, except for needed services, will not open. City health department child welfare clinics in locations outside city hall will also be closed. Milwaukee public libraries and the museum will be closed.

The Wisconsin Tavernkeepers association has asked that all taverns be closed from 10 a.m. to noon Monday.

Program in Hartland

Hartland, Wis., will hold a community memorial program at 10 a.m. in Arrowhead high school. A representative of each of the various Hartland organizations will place a long stem rose in a wreath below a picture of the late president. The program, co-ordinated by American Legion post 294, will include veterans organizations, churches, service groups, and governmental officials.

South Milwaukee will hold a memorial parade at 2 p.m. from city hall to a war memorial on N. Chicago and E. Rawson avs. Civic, veterans and city officials will take part. A wreath will be placed at the memorial.

South Milwaukee city offices will be closed at 10:30 a.m. Most stores and banks in the suburb will not open until 2 p.m.

Requiem masses will be offered for President Kennedy in most Catholic churches at the request of Archbishop William E. Cousins.

The Greater Milwaukee Council of Churches will sponsor a 4 p.m. service at First Methodist church, 1010 W. Wisconsin av. Local Catholic and Lutheran Wisconsin and Missouri synod schools are closed Monday.

Episcopal Bishop Donald H. V. Hallock asked clergymen of the Milwaukee diocese to hold memorial services. Bishop Hallock will conduct a requiem mass at All Saints cathedral, 818 E. Juneau av.

Regular navy men and reservists will attend a 10 a.m. mass in Gesu. Many Jewish congregations also will hold services in tribute to the president.

Concordia college, which will have no classes Monday, will have a memorial service at 9:30 a.m. in the school's gymnasium. The Rev. Roy Suelflow, chairman of the department of religion, will give the sermon. The Rev. Walter W. Stuenkel, president of the college, is in charge of the program.

At 7 p.m., a musical program of recordings, entitled "a musi-

cal message in time of national distress," will be held in the college chapel.

Other schools that will be closed besides elementary and secondary schools in the Milwaukee area are: the Vocational school, Milwaukee School of Engineering, Layton School of Art, Alverno, Cardinal Stritch, Mount Mary, Concordia, Milwaukee - Downer, Spencerian, Prospect hall, Wisconsin Conservatory, Milwaukee Institute of Technology and Wisconsin College of Music.

The Milwaukee school system's central office, 5225 W. Vliet st., will be closed along with Milwaukee schools.
