

Milwaukeeans Will Pause for Kennedy Rites

Milwaukee will pause Monday

with the rest of the nation to honor the late President John F.

Kennedy.

Much of the business of the city will stop.

There generally will be no school. Many stores will delay opening. Postal service will be curtailed.

Local and county government will come to a halt, except for necessary services.

Churches and other groups will hold special memorial services. Many churches will toll

their bells from 3 to 3:30 p.m.

21 Gun Salute

A 21 gun salute will be fired at 3 p.m. Monday in the Memorial Center,

sponsored by the Milwaukee County Allied Veterans coun-

cil, which represents most of

the veterans groups.

A wreath will be cast into

the honor roll pool and taps will be sounded. The Blitz American Legion band will also

be present.

Officials of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, includ-

ing J. Martin Klotzsche, the provost, will go to Madison Mon-

day for a memorial tribute at

3 p.m. in Bascom hall. Some

students and faculty members from UWM also will attend the

service.

Father William F. Kelley,

S.J., president of Marquette University, will give the eulogy

at a solemn memorial mass to

be offered at 4:30 p.m. Monday

in Gesu Catholic church.

Father James Corrigan, S.J.,

will be the celebrant.

Marquette, the University of Wisconsin, Madison and Mil-

waukee, and other colleges and universities will be closed.

All postal and federal em-

ployees, active and retired, were invited Sunday by Pioneer branch No. 2 of the Letter Car-

riers association to attend a memorial mass at 11 a.m. Mon-

day in St. John cathedral. The letter carriers, who were re-

quested to be in uniform, will

assemble at 10:30 a.m. in front

of the main post office, 517 E.

Wisconsin av., and march to

the church.

Postal service will be the same as on Veterans' day, Post-

master Frederick C. T. John announced. There will be no carrier or window service.

Civic, veterans and city offi-

cials will take part. A wreath will be placed at the memorial.

The Greater Milwaukee Council of Churches will sponsor a "distress," will be held in the college chapel.
