A Pulitzer Prize winner and former editor of the Atlanta Constitution, Patterson has been appointed to the faculty of Duke's newly created Institute of Policy Sciences and Public Affairs.

He will begin teaching this fall as a professor of the practice of political science and communications media in public affairs.
